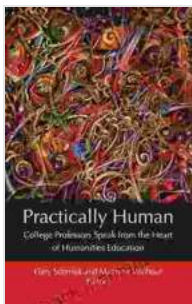


College Professors Speak From The Heart of Humanities Education

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The Importance of the Humanities

"The humanities are essential for developing the whole person," said Dr. Sarah Jones, an associate professor of English at the University of California, Berkeley. 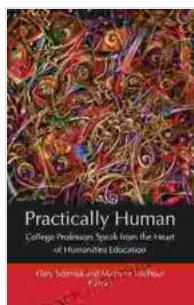
"Interdisciplinary approaches allow students to see the connections between different fields of study," said Dr. Jones. "This helps them to understand the world in a more holistic way."

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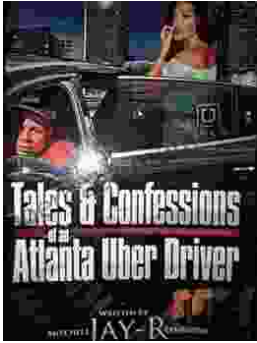
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
